## March Vendor Sale Speaker

**Robin Parer**  
*Geraniaceae 101*

SHEPARD GARDEN AND ARTS CENTER

Hardy geraniums, pelargoniums, erodiums and monsonias all belong to the Geraniaceae—otherwise known as The Geranium Family. While often referred to as “those red things,” they have been considered either dearly beloved or nearly despised by generations of California gardeners. This is an amazingly diverse group of plants which include tuberous rooted and night-scented pelargonium species, scented-leaf pelargoniums, ivy geraniums (angels and pansy face), rosebuds, fancy leaf, alpine erodiums (which grow so beautifully in containers), blue wildflowers (a favorite of perennial gardeners), and many thousands of plants in between. We will look at selected members of The Geranium Family and talk about their similarities and differences. We will also discuss how to care for these plants in the fierce summer climate of the Central Valley.



### Robin Parer 2017 Vendor Sale Speaker

**Robin Parer** is an Australian-born horticulturist who lectures frequently to garden groups and societies throughout the United States. She has been featured in many magazines and newspapers including *Sunset*, *House and Garden* and *The New York Times*. She recently finished writing *The Plant Lover's Guide to Hardy Geraniums*, which was published by Timber Press in 2016 and is available on Amazon.

Robin has owned and operated Geraniaceae Nursery in Marin County near San Francisco, California for the past 34 years, and has collected and propagated over 500 geranium species, selected color forms and hybrids. She has traveled widely, collecting both in the field, and from nurseries in the U.K., Europe, South America, Southern Africa and Australasia.

### Growing Healthy / Growing Knowledge

Aldar Academy  
Mission Oaks, Sacramento

This school involves students in the joy of gardening by growing food for cooking and flowers for arranging. Student learning includes hands-on gardening experiences and curriculum which is tied to horticulture and healthy eating. Grant funds will be used to build new raised beds in their vegetable garden area, replacing those that have worn out.



### Elk Grove Community Children's Garden

Elk Grove Community Garden & Learning Center  
Hampton Village, Elk Grove

The Elk Grove Community Garden features 88 raised beds, numerous fruit trees, bee hives, and a Children's Garden. Master Gardeners offer classes and workshops at the center and all the produce grown in the gardens is donated to the local Food Bank. Grant funds will be used to purchase concrete pavers for a more stable walkway in the Children's Garden.



### ReSoil Sacramento Compost Centers

Green Restaurants Alliance Sacramento  
Midtown Sacramento

ReSoil Sacramento is a community network which produces healthy soil at compost centers in the area using organic scraps from 15 Sacramento restaurants. They teach composting techniques and train compost center teams. Grant funds will supply four new composting centers at two midtown community gardens, an Adult School in East Sacramento, and the International Rescue Committee Refugee Farm in West Sacramento. They will also erect garden signage giving credit to SPPC for our support.



### Murer House Garden Shed Project

The volunteer gardeners who tend the historic gardens at the Murer House endeavor to protect the original plantings, and restore, amend and rebuild the landscaping surrounding the home. Grant funds will go towards the purchase of a much-needed garden shed to house all the gardening tools in one easily accessible location on the property.


